The Southwestern Medical Foundation announced this year's scholarship recipients at a luncheon last month.

The event at the T. Boone Pickens Biomedical Building at UT Southwestern gave philanthropists a chance to meet the medical students who get the scholarships. This year, the foundation gave \$223,500 in scholarships to 177 medical students.
