Randy Best is Chairman and Founder of Academic Partnerships. He founded Voyager Expanded Learning, a national initiative that helps more than four million mostly inner-city children learn to read. In 2005, Mr. Best turned to higher education and founded a network of high-quality universities across South America. Subsequently, he founded Academic Partnerships, a higher education service provider, which helps public universities increase access through technology-aided learning and gives them global reach. Mr. Best serves or has served on several boards and councils focusing on improved educational opportunities, including the Education Commission of the States. He also served on the White House Millennium Committee and is a benefactor of the Smithsonian Institution.



Randy Bowman

Randy Bowman founded, co-owned, and presided over a successful logistics company that served the North American continent for Fortune 500 customers. He now invests — primarily in industrials and under-invested urban areas (like Red Bird in Dallas). Bowman recently launched AT LAST!, providing impoverished elementary students the same educational resources and tools during the home life portion of their day as enjoyed by students in more prosperous homes. Further, he serves on the Boards of Impact Dallas Capital, a mezzanine fund which supports the Mayor's Grow South effort, and the City of Dallas Employee Retirement Fund. He chaired the Parkland Foundation Board as it raised \$150 million to complete funding for new Parkland Hospital.



Linda P. Custard

Linda P. Custard is the General Partner of Custard/Pitts Land & Cattle Co. and is actively engaged in energy, real estate and ranching. Mrs. Custard was recently named a Trustee Emerita of Southern Methodist University, the highest honor that can be bestowed on a former Trustee by the University. She is an SMU Distinguished Alumna and a Distinguished Alumna of the Cox School of Business. She is a former Chairman and current Treasurer of the Sweetheart Ball, which raises money for cardiology at UT Southwestern Medical Center. She is a Life Trustee of the Susan G. Komen Foundation, and she serves on the boards of the Dallas Theater Center and The Hockaday School.



Cate Ford

Cate Ford grew up in Dallas where she attended The Hockaday School until earning her diploma at St. Paul's School in Concord, New Hampshire. She then graduated from Columbia University in 1999. Afterwards, Cate worked at The Walt Disney Company and Revlon, Inc. in New York and Rosewood Hotels & Resorts in Dallas. She is married to Jeremy Ford, and they have three children together. In addition to her involvement with their schools, Cate serves on the Ronald McDonald House of Dallas Board of Directors, the Ronald McDonald House Development Committee, the Women's Auxiliary to Children's Medical Center, and the Sweetheart Ball Committee.



Mark D. Gibson

Mark D. Gibson is a founding partner, director, and Chief Executive Officer of HFF, Inc. He is a trustee for the Urban Land Institute (ULI), a member of ULI's Executive Committee, and a member of ULI's IOPC Gold Council. He is a member of the Association of Foreign Investors in Real Estate and the University of Texas Real Estate Finance and Investment Center's Executive Committee. Further, he serves on the board of visitors at UT Southwestern University Hospitals and Clinics, and is a member of the McCombs School of Business Advisory Council at The University of Texas at Austin. He also is an advisory board member of Baylor Health Care System Foundation.



Ambassador Robert Jordan

Robert Jordan is Diplomat in Residence and Professor of Practice in the John G. Tower Center for Political Studies at Southern Methodist University. Todd Williams

Todd Williams is founding Chairman and CEO of The Commit Partnership, the nation's largest collective impact organization with over 200 institutions educating over 790,000 students focused together on meaningfully improving post-secondary completion levels across the Dallas/Fort Worth area. He is Education Policy Advisor to Dallas Mayor Michael R. Rawlings. Todd is a current trustee and former board chair for Austin College. Todd is on the board and was the founding chair of the regional advisory board for Teach for America in Dallas/Ft. Worth, and helped establish the Williams Preparatory School, a K-12 free tuition public charter that educates over 1,500 primarily low-income children in northwest Dallas. Todd was both a partner and global co-head of Goldman Sachs' real estate private equity investment area.
